The Work Mahi section on Tahatū Career Navigator has over 800 career ideas that students can explore and use to find information about the world of work.

Activities overview Tirohanga whānui ki ngā mahi

Use this guide to introduce your students to the different areas of Work Mahi and explore career ideas on Tahatū. Encourage your students to save their ideas to My kete so they can easily find them again later and share them with their whānau and teachers.

Activity 1: Exploring Work Mahi Mahi 1: Te torotoro mahi

Activity overview Tirohanga whānui ki te mahi

Activity: Exploring Work Mahi

To introduce students to the Work Mahi section and show them how to explore career ideas and build awareness of the information found there.

Activity type: Individually Time taken: 15-30 mins

Steps	Tahatū links and resources
Ask your students to click on the Work Mahi button on the left-hand menu of the Tahatū home page.	Work tahatu.govt.nz/work/
Click on the Explore career ideas button.	explore-career-ideas
Tip: Encourage students to look at all 12 categories before continuing.	
Conversation starters	
• What categories (job types) would you like to know more about?	

• Are there any categories you don't know anything about?





Activity: Exploring Work Mahi

Steps

Students can click on a category they're interested in, for example, 'Community and education'.

They can then click on a work area within that category.

Conversation starters

- What work areas are you are interested in learning more about?
- Did any of these work areas come up in your Interest quiz results?
- What other information would be helpful?

Now ask your students to choose a work area, for example, 'Social work and counselling'. This will take you to career ideas for that work area.

Choose a career idea

Students can click on a career idea they're interested in, for example, 'Career consultant', or ask them to identify 3 career ideas they would be interested in.

At this point they can start to explore further or save the career ideas to My kete to come back to later.

Explore a career idea

Go through the information on the career idea profile page your student chooses.


- Watch the video if there is one.
- Explore 'What would you do in this job?'
- Explore 'How can you get into this job?'
- **Research** the 'Find job opportunities' map and links to related Trade Me and SEEK jobs.
- **Repeat** this activity with similar career ideas and other categories.

Conversation starters

- What attracts you to these career ideas?
- How do they connect with your values and the interests you identified earlier?

Save to My kete

Encourage students to save their career ideas and other pages of interest into My kete to return to later.

Note: Students must have chosen and viewed a career idea before doing this activity

Activity: Guess my job

Steps	Tahatū links and resources
Based on having done Get inspired Activity 5 or Work Activity 1 students will have each chosen and viewed a career idea.	Explore career ideas tahatu.govt.nz/work/
The Guess my job activity is to have pairs try and guess what job their partner has chosen.	explore-career-ideas Guess my job worksheet
In pairs, one person will ask questions to guess the other person's chosen job, then swap around.	,,,
The challenge is to try to guess what job their partner has chosen.	
Hand out the Guess my job worksheet to help students with ideas for questions and to write down their answers.	
Tip: Students can use the Work Mahi section, career idea profiles and the search function to find their partner's career idea.	
Reflection questions after completing activity	

- What did you learn about your partner's job choice?
- What did you like about their job choice?
- Did you learn anything new about your job choice by doing this activity?

Activity 4: Career idea bingo Mahi 4: Wharewhare whakaaro aramahi

Activity overview

Tirohanga whānui ki te mahi

To encourage students to learn more about different career ideas and the world of work.

Activity type: Whole classroom Time taken: 10-15 mins

Linked activities: Get Inspired Activity 5 or Work Activity 1

Note: Students must have chosen and viewed a career idea before doing this activity

Activity: Career idea bingo

Steps	Tahatū links and resources
Based on having done Get Inspired Activity 5 or Work Activity 1 students will	Explore career ideas

Career idea bingo is where students are asked to fill out their bingo sheets by	explore-career-ideas
asking their classmates questions.	Career idea bingo sheet
 Ask students to select a career idea either from Work Activity 1 or their Interest quiz results and ask them to become familiar with their chosen career idea. 	
 Once students have viewed their chosen career idea on Tahatū, hand out bingo sheets. Students ask each other if their chosen career idea matches one of the criteria on the bingo sheet. 	
3. If that person's career idea matches, students write its name in that square.	

5. If that person's career idea matches, students write its name in that square. First one to bingo (5 vertically, horizontally or diagonally filled squares) wins.

There are two versions of the bingo sheets (version A and B) for you to choose from.

Adaptation of activity

You may wish to run an alternative version of this activity where you delete some bingo tiles and students try and fill out the entire grid instead. This could be using a 3 × 3 or 4 × 4 bingo grid.

You may also wish to change or delete bingo tiles to fit your school's context.

Activity 5: World of work card sort Mahi 5: Kōmaka kāri ao mahi

Activity overview Tirohanga whānui ki te mahi

To encourage students to learn more about career ideas, the world of work, different work environments, pay rates and training times, and have an awareness of the range of work categories available.

Activity type: In groups (3-4) Time taken: 30-45 mins

Activity: Image card sort

Steps	Tahatū links and resource
1. Get students into small table groups and hand out the image cards.	Explore career ideas
2. Have groups do a card sort based on an initial prompt.	tahatu.govt.nz/work/ explore-career-ideas
Examples of prompts:	Image card sort sets
 what is the easiest to hardest looking job 	indge eard sort sets
 what is the least to most fun looking job 	
what is the least to most stressful job	
 what job requires a little to a lot of creativity. 	
Ask groups to feedback on how they sorted the cards or what they guess the jobs on the cards might be.	
3. Have students identify what the jobs on the cards are using Tahatū. You can give hints if they are unsure where to explore. Some hints for students, as well as the card job titles and their locations on Tahatū, are below.	
4. Once groups have identified the jobs, have them note the training times for each, and sort the cards again from shortest to longest training time.	
5. Have groups reflect on how they initially grouped the cards compared to now when they know more about the jobs.	
6. If there is extra time, you may wish to have groups repeat Step 4 using pay rates or number of job ads as the sorting factor.	
Adaptation of activity	
Using card sorts is an effective way of engaging students and can work for a range of learning styles.	
You can use these card sets for other activities, such as:	
I know what this job does. Ask students to sort cards by: I know what this job does, I know a little, I don't know anything about this job. Then ask them to choose 3 cards (across all the piles) to research further using the Work Mahi section.	
'Yuck vs Yum'.	
A quick card sort that can help with exploration. Ask students to sort cards into 2 piles, Yum (yes) or Yuck (no). Then ask them to discard the Yuck cards and focus on the Yum ones. Next, ask them to choose 3 cards from their Yum pile to research further using the Work Mahi section.


Hint questions you can ask students


- Is there something recognisable in the background? Could that help you narrow down your search?
- Does this look like something you would do in class?
- Is there a job you know about that looks like this? Try looking for that first and see what else comes up.
- Brainstorm some key words for this image. Try searching those keywords and see what comes up.
- What type of equipment do you think the person is using? In what work category do you think people would use that equipment?


There are 3 card sets, beginner, medium and expert. Each set has 12 cards. You may wish to leave cards out from a set or mix in cards from different sets.



Activity 7: Employability skills Mahi 7: Ngā pūkenga whai mahi

Activity overview Tirohanga whānui ki te mahi

This activity introduces students to the skills employers are looking for, known as employability skills. It identifies how the skills we are already using can apply to the world of work.

Activity type: Individually or in pairs Time taken: 20-30 mins

Linked activities: Get inspired Activities 1, 2 and 3

Activity: Learning about employability skills

• Explain to students that there are key skills employers are looking for that can be transferred across a range of jobs.

- These skills can be developed from work experience, paid work and daily life, including from their interests, working in their community like at their mārae or church, and involvement in school activities and projects.
- The following activity shows students how they can gain employability skills through activities they are already doing. For example, kapa haka, basketball and poly group. They may have other activities to write about.

Activity

Steps

- Ask students to choose an activity they enjoy doing. For example, basketball, kapa haka and poly group.
- Ask them to fill out the employability skills worksheet.
- Using their interests and values they identified in Get Inspired Actvities 1, 2 and 3 ask them to write down their interests and values.
- Ask them to complete 'My story' where they write or draw an experience that links to their interests and values. For example, kapa haka.
- In the "My employability skills" box ask them to write or draw examples of the employability skills they have identified in their story.
