Welcome to Tahatū Career Navigator

The Tertiary Education Commission (TEC) has released its new career planning website - Tahatū Career Navigator, replacing the careers.govt.nz website which will be decommissioned in early December.

This Marketing Toolkit has been created to provide you with tools and messaging to share internally and externally across your networks and communication channels.

Who is Tahatū Career Navigator for?

Tahatū Career Navigator is for:

- anyone who wants help finding out what career they might like to do in the future, and the steps they can take to get there
- people returning to the workforce after an absence
- people wanting a career change
- whānau, friends, school career advisers, and community or agency career practitioners.

What Tahatū means

The name Tahatū means ‘horizon’, especially in relation to the sea, and reflects our focus on a lifelong learning journey, heading towards the future.

The Tahatū Career Navigator logo depicts Ngā hau e whā, the four winds. The changing winds were the tohu (signs) our ancestors read to guide them.

Tahatū Career Navigator will help users read the signs around them as they navigate their career journey.

Key messages

Tahatū Career Navigator built on solid research

- TEC carried out research with young people, whānau, teacher aides, school career advisers and private practice career practitioners. We consulted a wide range of organisations, including regulation and registration bodies.
- Tahatū Career Navigator builds on previous TEC career research, including [Transitions from secondary school](#), that looks at how school leavers decide what to do when they leave school. This involved analysing data on all 60,000 students that leave school each year, charting what pathways they take next. Over 500 school leavers were surveyed, including in-depth interviews with 56 school leavers across the country, to understand the 'why' behind these pathways.

Accessibility a priority on Tahatū Career Navigator

- Tahatū Career Navigator is designed to be accessible for all users by offering content in both English and te reo Māori, using clear language and providing inclusive resources that reflect diverse communities. It supports screen readers, keyboard navigation and high-contrast modes, ensuring ease of use for people with visual or physical impairments.
- The site is mobile-friendly, features captions and transcripts for multimedia content and follows best practice for assistive technology compatibility, creating an inclusive and user-friendly experience for everyone.

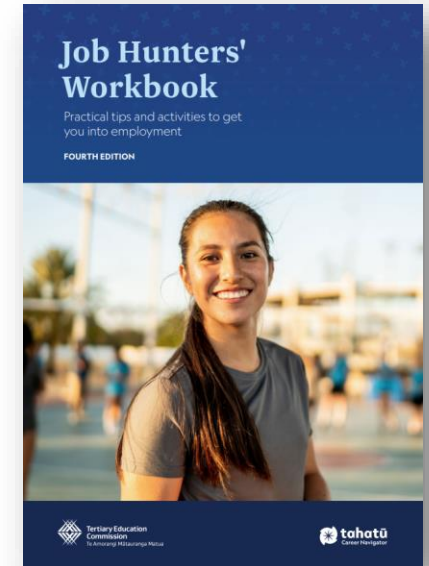
Key messages

- Tahatū Career Navigator is relevant in today's employment market, with links through to Trade Me Jobs and SEEK showing current job opportunities available throughout New Zealand. People will be able to search regularly updated career ideas and see the job vacancies for it in different regions. National launch campaign

The Tertiary Education Commission (TEC) has launched a nationwide campaign to support the public release of Tahatū Career Navigator, a trusted source of career information, tools, and resources for rangatahi and young adults aged 13–25.

Tahatū helps young people explore their interests, discover strengths, and plan meaningful pathways for their future, whether they're choosing NCEA subjects, considering study or training, or exploring options after their first job.

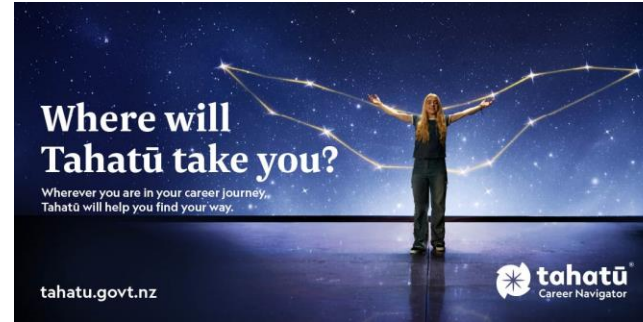

Primary logo – minimum size



The minimum size of our primary logo is 35mm wide. Minimum size for digital applications is 48px x 168px.

Logo – minimum clear space



Ensure there is a minimum clear space equal to the height of the 'h' on all sides.

Logo don'ts



Never add a drop shadow to the logo.



Never change the logo lock up.



Never alter the colour or add gradients to our logo.
