Te kaihoe

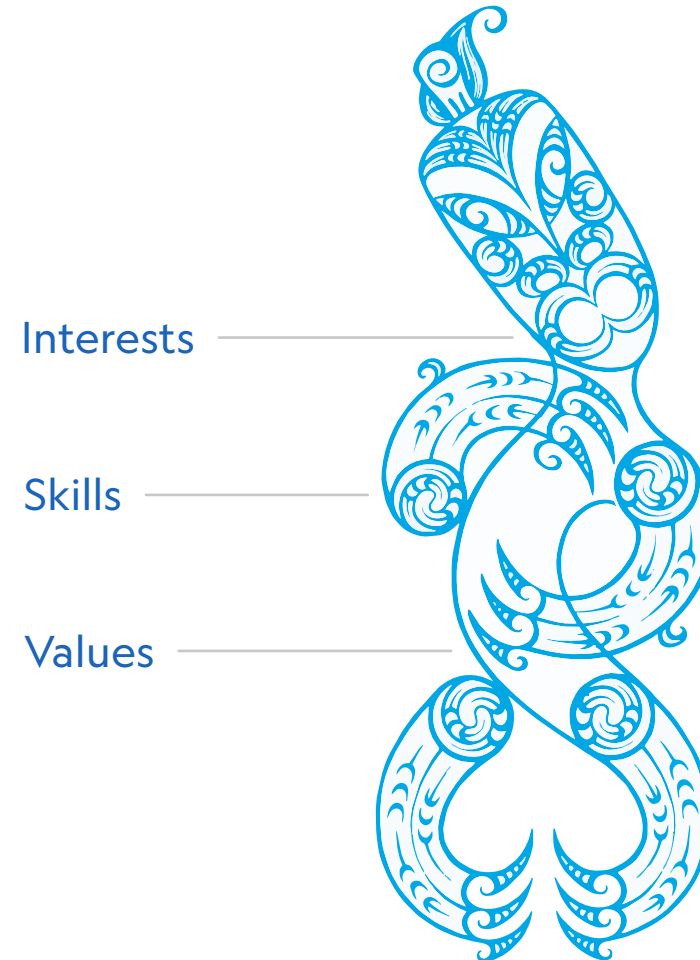
The paddler

The central figure in the image represents your whakapapa.

You are the kaihoe (paddler) travelling along your life's journey. You decide whether or not to take up the paddle, in which direction to steer the waka and how fast to paddle to reach your destination.

You are a representation of your whānau, hapū and iwi who are with you on your life journey.

You are the living image of your whakapapa – you are never travelling alone.

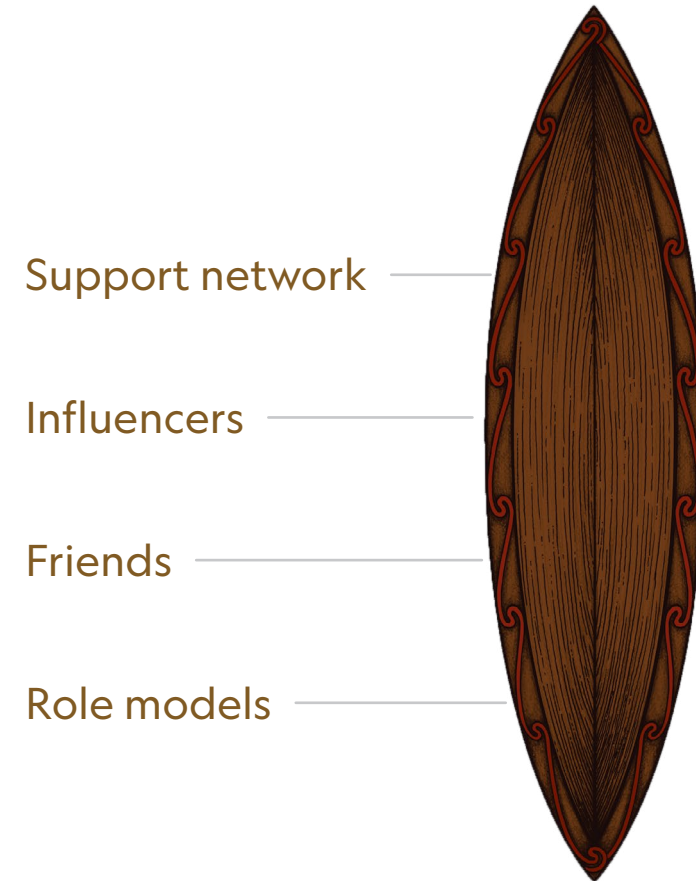


Te waka

The canoe

The waka represents the people you decide to have as part of your career journey – friends, family, school staff, role models, experts.

The support you receive helps determine your direction. There are many people available to be part of your journey. You determine who they are and their role on your waka.



Te hoe

The paddle

The hoe (paddle) represents your qualifications, skills, experiences and the relationships you acquire.

You will make your own hoe.

You determine its shape and how you will use it to pull your waka through the water.



Tangaroa

Guardian of the sea

The hidden face in the background is Tangaroa, the atua of the sea. Tangaroa represents the challenges and opportunities that will influence your pathways in life.
